

THE OFSAA EXPERIENCE

"With any kind of big event there are going to be obstacles that pop up, and the one way to get past those obstacles is to surround yourself with good people and that's what we did when we formed our committee." Convenor Craig Nodwell- via interview on the Frontline Broadcast

As a long-time coach, hosting an OFSAA championship had always been a goal (dream) of mine. North Bay, Ontario has been an OFSAA hosting hotbed over the past few decades, and I have witnessed several of my mentors such as Larry Tougas, Tim Lowe and Colleen Egan organize and run many of those successful championships here in the city. The hype surrounding an OFSAA and the resulting legacy a championship leaves is something that has always fascinated me. Going through this process has certainly been a career highlight and for all of us involved, something we won't soon forget.

In the spring of 2017, our volleyball program decided to enter a bid to host the 2020 AA OFSAA championships for a group of student athletes who were keen, talented and overall, just a kind group of young men. At the time, no one could have predicted some of the obstacles that would lay ahead, not just for our championship but for the entirety of humanity.



committee was built with several all-star educators who have been part of many OFSAA's here locally. Assistant Convenor Shawn Plamondon has run the Art Gabor Basketball Tournament, one of the longest running basketball tournaments in the province. Kadrienne Montcalm has been a part of at least 12 OFSAA's creating professional quality programs and websites. Mich Gagné has organized and implemented OFSAA livestreams and Mark Hopper successfully helped build and implement COVID protocols. Site convenors Tori Martin and Sara Pickles have been a part of at least a half dozens OFSAA's each. As a first-time convenor, having this team of people surrounding me was a recipe for success.

Our 2019 boys' volleyball season culminated with a city championship, and things seemed to be falling into place for a big 2020 season. Enter the COVID-19 pandemic, and the resulting shutdown of high school athletics across the province for the 2020-21 school year. Among many impacts, the pandemic altered the course of two and a half years of planning and preparation. Disappointment ensued as it appeared that we would lose out on our opportunity to host. Luckily for our committee, the fall 2021

championship remained open without a host and once it was offered to us, we quickly accepted and got back to work. We did this knowing the uncomfortable reality that any championship in the future could be cancelled. With the pandemic being a regular constant in our lives, the landscape of hosting an OFSAA championship changed drastically.

The turning point for us as





a committee occurred during the OFSAA convenor's summer meeting in August of 2021. Assistant Director Shamus Bourdon opened the meeting by stating, "If OFSAA doesn't lead the way, who is going to ensure that high school athletics proceeds across the province?" That quote smashed any uncertainty I had entering the meeting, and we felt comfortable moving forward as a committee. OFSAA COVID protocols were released shortly afterwards. The protocols are designed with safety in mind, are very thorough and well thought out. Big thank you to Ian Press and the team at OFSAA who worked diligently to create these. These protocols served as the framework that our committee used to create our championship specific protocols. Once created, we sent the protocols to the Near North District School Board and the North Bav- Parry Sound Health Unit for feedback and approval. Gym sites had separate entrances and exits, QR Code contact tracing type forms, hand sanitization



stations throughout the sites, and cleaning of shared materials throughout the championship. Student safety was paramount and always at the forefront of our decision-making. While these procedures may seem daunting and difficult to implement, it must be noted that all of the attending teams did a phenomenal job adhering to the protocols. The team at OFSAA, specifically lan, Shamus, and Pat Park were always available to answer questions and assist us in our planning process. We are grateful to them for their leadership and assistance.

Collaboration and teamwork was not limited to our committee members or Chippewa Secondary School alone. The Near North District School Board firmly got behind our efforts and










supported it. Director Craig Myles and the rest of the senior administration team supported this endeavour in a variety of ways. Principals from five Near North schools freed up staff members to support the championship. Custodial staff and secretarial staff were paramount in ensuring cleanliness and safety of Near North gymnasiums. This OFSAA championship was most definitely a Near North united event.

Our goal as a committee was to create our championship as a true OFSAA experience. With COVID 19 protocols present, the lack of fans and the cancellation of the OFSAA banquet a reality, our committee felt that we needed to bring something that would add value to the championship. As such, the registration night was redesigned as a "red carpet" registration night where teams had the opportunity



to sign up for a time slot. The entirety of our volunteer force dressed up in semi formal attire to welcome the participants. The school's foyer was transformed into a welcome center consisting of a canoe filled with donated drinks, servers with trays of food and snacks, a swag bag table, balloons, and a 12 foot welcome to OFSAA sign that the players could take pictures with. After working their way through the foyer, players were escorted to the gym where they received their team banner, team and individual photo opportunities. The night was a resounding success and teams were happy with the reception.


The resulting championship was hard fought by the 10 teams in attendance. It was clear from the smiles on the court that the players were thankful to be in the gym again competing for top honours in the province. In an exciting twist, the 7th seed home team Chippewa Secondary School went unbeaten all the way to the championship final and upset the 1st seed E.L. Crossley of SOSSA from Fonthill, Ontario. It was Chippewa's first gold medal at OFSAA volleyball since 1996.

Despite the victory, the real win was that OFSAA made a successful return, students were hosted in a safe environment, and they received a true OFSAA experience, something which we all value and respect. As we move forward into the winter season, our committee is coming together for a second time to host the girls' AA championship and we couldn't be more excited to host the best in the province.


Cancer Kept Him From Golf, But A Waterloo, Ont., Team's Sportsmanship Left Him A Winner

A high school golf team conceded a championship win on Thursday, letting a team with an ineligible player, who had missed a year due to cancer treatment, take the top prize.

Zach Hart, 19, was ineligible to compete with the Waterloo Oxford District Secondary School golf team at the WCSSAA Championship on Thursday due to his age.

But the team allowed him to take part, competing as an alternate, because of the year he missed while being treated for a brain tumour and another year missed because of the pandemic.

The Waterloo Oxford team won, but was told it could not submit Hart's score and could only use the scores of the other three players as the total.

"I was an eligible golfer, but they said if we took my score, we would have been disqualified," Zach said. While the Waterloo County Secondary School Athletic Association allowed him to compete because he missed a year, he wasn't eligible to be a part of the overall team score because of his age.

Because of Hart's ineligibility, Bluevale Collegiate Institute won instead. That is, until Bluevale players made a surprising decision.

"I forget which one, but one of them pretty quickly said, 'This doesn't feel right. Can we just like forfeit or, let them win somehow?" said Jason Forget, Bluevale Collegiate Institute's golf coach.

In an act of true sportsmanship, each member of the Bluevale team disqualified themselves from the event, allowing Waterloo Oxford to win.

Forget has been coaching high school sports for 16 years and says he's never seen anything like it.

"That is the proudest and the neatest thing I've witnessed," Forget said.

"It was really shocking, actually. I knew one of the kids on their team, because we've golfed together before," Hart said.

Hart was one of the best junior golfers in Canada in 2018, winning the Maple Leaf Junior Tour (MJT) National Championship. Then he was diagnosed with a brain tumour in 2019.

"Where the brain tumour was, it was pushing on his brainstem, and it was pushing on the occipital nerve. So he was losing all motor skills," his father, Chris Hart, said.

After three brain surgeries and chemotherapy, Zach Hart is now done his treatment and regularly goes for MRIs.

"I was swinging a club 20 days after my first chemo cycle," Hart said.

In 2020, Hart returned to school and graduated, but he wasn't able to compete in any sports due to the pandemic. So he returned for 2021 to play again.

"So he lost out, lost out, lost out. So I was very proud of him, for him to say 'Hey Dad, I'm going to go back to school, grab a couple credits, play on the golf team, have a little bit of fun," Chris said.

Since his treatment, Hart has worked with the Canadian Blood Services, Paediatric Oncology Group of Ontario, The Ontario Hockey League, Bruce Power, BarDown.com and the SickKids Foundation, sharing his story with the public and helping raise funds for cancerrelated causes.

Most recently, he started working with other young elite athletes going through journeys similar to his, including a female tennis athlete with leukemia.

"It was one of the hardest things because I finally got to see what my parents saw," Hart said. "In the spring, I'd love to have a tennis match against her."

Hart plans to continue swinging a club as long as he can, hoping to create a professional career working in golf.

KAYLEE: Captain Ace represents determination to strive for your goals even if you are set back. Keep going and strive for your goal despite the path. Just "keep going!"


OFSAA: Have you done any other drawings for contests?

Congratulations 2021 Brian Maxwell Memorial Scholarship Winners

OFSAA and the Brian Maxwell Memorial Scholarship Fund were very pleased to announce the student-athlete recipients for 2021.

These student-athletes with a track and field or cross country pedigree in high school are continuing their post-secondary education at a Canadian college or university. The scholar-athletes display qualities of honesty, integrity, compassion and an unwavering quest to accomplish the best academically and athletically while supporting fellow team members. These were all qualities of Brian Maxwell. Each recipient will receive \$5,000.

The scholarship fund is in memory of Brian Maxwell, a successful distance runner. Brian competed in track and field and cross country and achieved success as an OFSAA champion, and a Canadian junior, juvenile and senior champion. He also won numerous international marathons. In 1980, he was selected to the Canadian Olympic team and later became a successful entrepreneur who, with his wife, Jennifer, co-founded the nutritional supplement PowerBar.

Brian was born with a defective heart valve and in 2004, at only 51 years of age, died of a heart attack.

OFSAA is appreciative for the opportunity to partner with the Brian Maxwell Memorial Scholarship Fund each year to support students continuing their education in Canada.

Please meet the worthy recipients of the 2021 Brian Maxwell Memorial Scholarship:



Zoe Gardiner is a six-time qualifier for OFSAA, three in Cross Country and three in Track and Field. She was a key member of her school's OFSAA Championship XC team in 2017 and 2018. In 2019, her school finished 5th, capping a terrific XC career. Her best individual result was 6th in the Senior Girls 1500m in Guelph in 2019. Academically, Zoe achieves as well in the classroom as she does in running.

Zoe is attending McGill University this fall, where she is enrolled in the Faculty of Science, with the goal of graduating with a BSc in Biology.

At Glebe CI, Zoe has been involved in Students' Council for all of her years in high school. She was also a member of the school link crew, which supported the transition of incoming grade 9's to high school, as well as working with students to ensure they are doing okay. She is also a member of their mental health committee and was a founding member of a campaign initiated by the school for sexual assault victims.

In her community, Zoe was the co-founder, organizer and participant of a non-profit in 2015. She has raised over \$10,000 for various charities such as KidSport, a Crock-pot program, Ottawa Hospital for Cancer research, a women's shelter and a reconciliation village in Rwanda. She also has been heavily involved in an initiative to get young female soccer players from around the world to support and share in the empowerment of women through discussion panels, workshops and awareness/exchange programs. Finally,

she found the time to be a volunteer soccer coach at a number of Ottawa area soccer programs and at the National Track and Field Championships.

Perhaps her greatest achievement is the Award of Honour she and her teammates received for their leadership and fundraising of over \$6000 to set up a sports development centre in Pasla, India.

She is described by her coach as being compassionate, selfless, and hard-working. Always striving to help others be the best they can be, all the while doing the same for herself.



Molly Strain is a seven-time qualifier in cross country and track and field. As a Grade 9 student, she placed 3rd in Open Girls 1500m Steeplechase and MG 3000m. In Grade 10, she was the OFSAA Champion in the first time held Open Girls 2000m Steeplechase. She came back the next day and was 6th in the Junior Girls 3000m. In cross country, her best placement was 9th in her grade 9 year and as a first-year senior, she was 11th.

As with all of our nominees, Molly excels in the classroom as well, where she is a high achieving Ontario Scholar.

A well-rounded athlete, Molly has played rep soccer and has been a nordic skier. She was named one of the top-10 athletes in Peterborough in 2019 and was nominated by her community for the INSPIRE: The Women's Portrait Project.

This fall, Molly is taking her talents to UBC for Kinesiology, where she will run for their XC and T&F teams.

In her community, Molly has volunteered at the Lakefield Animal shelter, taking care of animals. She has also volunteered at a horse stable, caring for horses, supervising kids learning to ride as well. She also assisted with the Peterborough City Soccer Camp and elementary volleyball tournaments.

She is described by her coach as someone who has the kind of intestinal fortitude rarely seen among teenagers. She is a young athlete that her peers and coaches can see wearing the Canadian singlet internationally in a few years.



Elissa Frielink attended Unity Christian High School in Barrie, where she was a valued member of her school's cross country and track and field teams, in addition to achieving high grades in her studies.

She is a seven-time qualifier to OFSAA -- three times in Cross Country and four times in track and field. Her best finish was a bronze medal in XC as a Grade 9 student. In Grade 10, she placed 4th in Cross country. She completed her XC experience with a 12th place finish as a first-year senior. In Track and Field, she was 5th in the 800m and 8th in the 1500m as a grade 9 student and in grade 10, she was 4th in the 800m and 7th in the 1500m.

At school, she was on basketball, volleyball and badminton teams. She volunteered with school plays and officiated in track and field meets at her school for elementary students. She was also involved with a school bible/prayer group.

In her community, she has been active in her church, from caregiving to young children during church, to teaching Sunday school lessons and working at a bible camp in the summer. 
Around his school, he has been involved in student council, played numerous other sports and participated in countless musicals and school plays. Music and acting are one of his passions, having performed in plays and in community events.

For 15 years, the Ontario Coaching Excellence Awards program celebrates the dedication and commitment of exemplary individuals who inspire, innovate and share knowledge of sport with others. The Awards recognize the importance of leadership, performance and the value of human insight which are all integral to great coaching. Coaches were recognized and celebrated virtually from across Ontario at the 2021 Ontario Coaching Excellence Awards on September 17.

The ceremony marked the start of the seventh annual national Coaches Week, a celebration of the tremendous positive impact coaches had on this nation's athletes and communities. The week is an opportunity to recognize coaches for the integral role they play by simply saying #ThanksCoach.

The School Sport Coach winners were selected by OFSAA based on their unique contribution to sport through continuous development. The Award does not reflect the accomplishments of a teacher-coach in any one year, but the contributions over a period of years.

2021 male recipient of the "Coaching Excellence Award in the School Sport Category":



COLIN WARD - NOSSA, Lo-Ellen Park SS

Colin Ward's impressive coaching resume includes coaching cross country running and track and field over the past 22 years. For the last seven years, he's also coached nordic skiing. As a convenor, Colin organized a safe competition in the Sudbury region in the fall of 2020 as the rest of Ontario was unable to compete because of high COVID numbers.

Colin encourages and inspires students of all capabilities to practice and stay fit all year long, as they transition their training from cross country running, to nordic skiing and finally track and field. He models fitness for life and influences athletes to acquire the skills needed for life-long participation and fitness in sport.

His number one goal with all of his student-athletes is to encourage the comradery of their sport and emphasizes that every aspect of their training and competition is 'team oriented'. They feed off each other to push themselves past their mental and physical challenges. Athletes build friendships that last long after they graduate high school. Friday evenings throughout the school year, often involve workouts followed by snacks or pot-luck dinners. Colin develops the 'whole athlete', emphasizing character development and giving back to the community, along with the physical and nutritional aspects of sport. Many of his student athletes have gone on to run events within the community and are involved in running some of the elementary races in the Region.

At a shared training facility in his local area, Colin is often seen assisting athletes from various schools. His endearing philosophy is to develop all athletes, regardless of the school attended by the athlete.

KELLY GOUVEIA - ROPSSAA, Fletcher's Meadow SS

When coaching students, Kelly ensures that she provides opportunities for all grade levels and various athletic abilities to participate on teams in order to develop players. She has dedicated her time to coaching girls flag football (17 years), track and field (20+ years), badminton (15 years) and girls' soccer (20+ years). For her entire career, she has coached in all three seasons on the calendar. Kelly considers the needs of those students who are typically oppressed or marginalized and understands how to support them.

Kelly develops and supports coaches and works with them to implement effective coaching practices. She's always willing to engage with teachers just entering the profession or stepping into a coaching role to provide guidance and mentorship. Kelly played a key role in establishing the development of girls' flag football in ROPSSAA and her colleagues rely heavily on Kelly's wide knowledge with sporting rules, regulations, policies and procedures.

Kelly has been a valuable member of the ROPSSAA Executive for the past seven years. As a new member, she volunteered to be the OFSAA Girls' rep and continues to do so in 2021. She is also part of the ROPSSAA and OFSAA transfer committees. She has spent the past four years as the chair of the ROPSSAA committee. She has worked hard with ROPSSAA and OFSAA to review the transfer policy and has worked on motions to adjust to the changing climate of high school sport. Kelly looks for a way to get everyone to participate and this leader always thinks of all possibilities when it comes to the best interest of students.

2021 OFSAA Football Bowls Series

November 20 - December 1, 2021





The OFSAA Football Bowls Series Festival returned this year after a one-year absence due to COVID-19. The format was much different than in past years and the number of associations that were able to participate was down from seventeen to eleven. As well, it became necessary to use six high school fields to host individual games because of our inability to host at public or private facilities due to vaccination requirements. Each of the high schools had a separate site convenor and OFSAA owes the following individuals a big thank you for their efforts in staging the games for the student-athletes from the participating schools: James Clarke, Tom Annett, Jonathan Bujold, Jeff McDougall, Alex Frescura, David Thomas, Brian Daly and Tom Pain.

The following are the results from the six Bowl Games that were contested. Statistics were not available from all sites.

NORTHERN BOWL - Played in Sault Ste. Marie at Superior Heights C&VS, the Northern Bowl featured St. Ignatius

(NWOSSAA) and Korah (NOSSA). After a close first half which saw Korah take a 13-0 lead, the Colts defence dominated the second half while the offence kicked into gear resulting in a 37-7 victory for the NOSSA Champions. Mike Nicoletta scored 3 touchdowns for Korah while Tyler Robertson scored the lone TD for the Falcons. This was Korah's third consecutive Bowl Game victory.

EASTERN BOWL - Centennial SS (COSSA) hosted Frontenac (EOSSAA) in this year's Eastern Bowl in Belleville. Near the end of the first half, the Falcons returned an interception for a touchdown and a 13-0 lead at the intermission. In the second half, Centennial scored first to narrow the score but Frontenac scored 24 unanswered points to win their eighth Bowl Game. For Centennial, it was their second appearance in a Bowl Game and their first since 2000.

METRO BOWL - St. Roch CSS (ROPSSAA) travelled into Toronto to take on St. Michael's College (CISAA) in this year's Metro





Bowl. The Ravens used a balanced offence and a tremendous defence to beat St. Michael's 48-0. This was St. Roch's second appearance in the Bowl Festival and they have been victorious both times while St. Michael's has taken part in nine Bowl Games since they played in the first Metro Bowl in 1982.

CENTRAL BOWL - Brantford was the site of this year's Central Bowl between Notre Dame College (SOSSA) and North Park (CWOSSA). Tal Ibrahim scored five touchdowns for the Irish in their 50-7 victory. Garwayne Rowe had the lone North Park touchdown on a 95-yard kick-off return to start the second half. For the Irish, this was their first Bowl victory in their third appearance while North Park was making their first trip to OFSAA.

INDEPENDENT BOWL - In a much-anticipated matchup between two of the most successful high school teams in the province, Huron Heights (YRAA) visited St. Thomas More (GHAC) in Hamilton to contest the Independent Bowl. Neither team disappointed in what was a tremendous defensive struggle. Huron Heights scored two rushing touchdowns and held the Knights to six points on their home field to win the game 14-6.

GOLDEN HORSESHOE BOWL- In the final game of this year's OFSAA Festival, the host from Westmount (SOSSA) defeated Chaminade (TDCAA) 17-7 in a hard fought, defensive battle. Westmount scored late in the game to provide the 10- point cushion and win their second Bowl Game in a row. Chaminade was making their 5th appearance at the Football Festival.


